SORRENTO: A CLIFFTOP HAVEN WITH A LEGENDARY PAST

Set along Italy's dramatic southwestern coastline, Sorrento sits like a balcony overlooking the sea. Its position has made it desirable - and strategic - for over 2000 years. Even its name is tied to the ancient Greek sirens, whose hypnotic songs were said to lure sailors onto the rocks below. Thankfully, today's visitors are drawn instead by its beauty, warm culture, and laid-back charm.

Brightly painted houses cascade down the cliffs, narrow lanes weave through centuries-old architecture, and the scent of lemons - especially the region's famed sfasato amalfitano - floats in the air.

Insider Tip: The historic centre of Sorrento is only steps from most hotels. Wander via San Cesareo for handcrafted leather, limoncello tastings, and some of the best gelato you'll ever find.

Sorrento began as a Greek settlement, flourished under the Romans, and later grew into a medieval maritime hub. Roman nobles once built their cliffside

Message from the Executive Director

s fall approached, arbitration continued and by mid-October a final resolution was reached on the three outstanding matters, bringing an end to the protracted negotiation process. Our attention then turned to updating the wage schedules to reflect the arbitrator's decision and award, with both the Conference and OSM agreeing to target the end of November to have those schedules ready for publication.

While work continued diligently on the updates, OSM completed and issued Bulletin #17-25 on November 14 – ahead of schedule – which included the Sheet Metal, Sheeting & Decking, and the new Test & Balance Appendices for the province highlighting the monetary increases were subject to retroactivity.

The outcome of negotiations and arbitration ultimately resulted in what could be viewed as a down-the-middle deal, with OSM's negotiating committee remain-

ing focused throughout and prioritizing the avoidance of a potentially costly strike.

In late July, the Canadian Sheet Metal Apprentice Competition was held in Toronto and in early October, the Ontario Competition was held in Windsor. Special thanks to the Ontario Sheet Metal Workers Training Centre, whose efforts make these competitions a success. I was also pleased to present the



Wally McIntosh Apprentice Award to Jamie Weir at the training centre in Oakville. More on the competitions and the Wally McIntosh Award are included in this issue of the Crossflow.

The Conference held its annual convention and elections while attending the Ontario Apprentice Competition. Those elections resulted in LU47 (Ottawa) Business Manager, Brent James being elected as the new Conference President replacing Dan Krupa of LU397 (Thunder Bay). Mr. James hopes to bring change by beginning to pave the way for better relations between labour and management which have deteriorated in recent years.

The Ontario Skills Development Fund (SDF) continues to bolster the Skilled Trades to equip individuals with the skills required to succeed in today's workforce. The fund aims to address critical labour shortages by providing resources for apprenticeships, hands-on trade training, and programs that prepare workers for indemand trades such as construction, manufacturing, electrical, plumbing, and sheet metal work. By investing in skills development in these areas, the SDF strengthens Ontario's workforce, improves employability, and supports economic growth across key sectors. The ability for the union to address insufficient manpower was a key concern raised during negotiations.

In terms of connecting with our membership, I recently had the opportunity to tour the Cunningham Sheet Metal (Windsor) Ltd. facility. Founded in 1908, the company has established itself as a custom fabricator and installer with expertise in specialty materials. Cunningham Sheet Metal is well positioned for the future through investments in the latest laser technology. Its diversified capabilities and expertise not only allow it to serve the Industrial, Commercial, and Institutional (ICI) sheet metal sectors, but also enable a broader range of customized work in other areas of metal-working.

In early September registration opened for the 2026 Transcend Rhine River

APPRENTICE AWARD

Winner of Wally McIntosh Apprentice Award

amie Weir didn't originally have his sights set on the ICI sheet metal trade. In fact, he may have found it almost by accident over a family dinner.

After taking time to figure out his true calling, the 33-year-old initially pursued residential HVAC but never felt completely fulfilled. In 2019, encouraged by his younger brother Greg, who had already ventured down a path in the sheet metal trade, Weir made the leap to the commercial side of the industry.

"I like the hands-on work and the fact that all your work is exposed, so you can take pride in everything you've done," Weir said. "You're constantly thinking about the math aspect of everything you do, if it's figuring out angles or trying to determine how everything fits together."

Weir immediately knew he was in the right place once he started his journey at the Ontario Sheet Metal Trades Training School in Oakville, ON.

"I was genuinely interested in the material and wanted to learn everything I could to take back to my day-to-day work," he said. "That's when I realized how much I really enjoyed the sheet met-

al trade."

Throughout his seven-year career, the most valuable lesson Weir has learned is the importance of asking questions. Because the industry is never "cut and dry," challenges often arise when fitting or installing ductwork that require problem-solving and a fresh perspective. For Weir, every obstacle in the field becomes a learning opportunity.

Beyond his role with Summit Mechanical in Peterborough, ON, Weir has showcased his talent in apprentice competitions across local, provincial, and national stages. It wasn't an opportunity he initially sought out, but a little encouragement from Ontario Sheet Metal Trades Training School Instructor Joe Hawley convinced him to take the leap.

"I had no interest in participating in any competitions at first, but Joe really encouraged me to take part, and I'm so glad I did," he said. "It was a great experience meeting people you might never connect with otherwise and getting to showcase your skills. You can really take pride in what you accomplish."

After winning the Local 30 Union competition, Weir went on to place second at both the Ontario competition in



Peterborough in 2023 and the Canadian competition in Moncton, NB, in May 2024. These achievements not only highlighted his technical skills, they also strengthened his confidence.

Weir was "really excited" when he learned he had won the Wally McIntosh Apprentice Award. With a final mark of 98 per cent, the recognition felt especially rewarding.

"When I was in school, I didn't even realize there was an award for excelling," he said. "I would have put the effort in either way, but it's great to be recognized for it."

Although he enjoys his current work in the field and tinkering with cars in his spare time, Weir is committed to continuing to grow in the sheet metal trade.

"There are so many opportunities and so many avenues you can take in this sector," he said. "It's not just installing duct. You can build systems in the shop, or you can do architectural work."

Who knows, maybe one day the next generation of sheet metal workers may just find Jamie Weir at the front of their classroom. It's a path he would gladly consider.

With his drive, curiosity, and passion for the craft, Weir shows that the best careers aren't always the ones you set your sights on, but instead the ones you grow into and the ones that inspire you to keep learning every day.



Precision, Pride, and Performance:

Apprentices Shine at 2025 Ontario Sheet Metal Competition

he 52nd Annual Ontario Sheet Metal Workers Apprenticeship Competition took place from September 30 to October 2 in Windsor, ON. Sponsored by the Ontario Sheet Metal Workers' & Roofers' Conference in cooperation with the Ontario Sheet Metal Contractors Association, the competition welcomed 16 apprentices from across Ontario who participated in three core components: theory, drafting, and a hands-on practical challenge.

This year's project was the Legacy 351 streetcar, recognized as Ontario's first electric vehicle of its kind.

"A lot of people don't understand what sheet metal workers do, and we're getting our name out there to hopefully find opportunities in the community where we can showcase our work and encourage people to come out, see what



ask questions," said Scott Wood, Provincial Training Director at the Ontario Sheet Metal Workers Training Centre in Oakville. "Not many trades offer a showcase like this. We're really happy and very proud of what we do."

Wood also noted the complexity behind the finished work. "There is so much involved in these small projects, much of which you don't see because it's hidden inside with seams and locks. The process has to be followed step by
